VILLAGE BOARD MEETING April 3, 2019 Minutes

Mayor Penders called the meeting to order 7:00 p.m. followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Public Hearing

Mayor Penders opened the public hearing for the 2019/2020 Budget at 7:00 p.m.

Mayor Penders explained the details of 2019/2020 Tentative Budget.

Mayor Penders thanked everyone who worked on the tentative budget. Mayor Penders commented that in past years the Village enacted the local law to exceed the 2% tax cap in the event of an error or unrealized expense. This year the Board felt that it was not necessary to enact that local law and that the 2% tax cap is now permanent.

Mayor Penders explained the difference between the reserved and unreserved fund balance. Mayor Penders continued that the unreserved fund balances in the general fund and sewer fund are funds that were not spent in previous budgets. The funds can be used to lower taxes in futures budget, special project or equipment purchases or in emergency situations. Mayor Penders indicated that the State Comptroller suggests that Villages keep 35% of their expenses in their unreserved fund balances.

Mr. Terry West, Coventry Drive asked where cash for the unreserved fund balance is invested.

Treasurer Kruger responded that the money is in a money market account.

Mayor Penders also indicated that the Village is looking into investing in US Treasury bills to increase their interest income.

Mr. West asked if the Village was limited as to how the funds could be used.

Mayor Penders responded that there are guidelines for the use of those funds.

Mayor Penders further explained that the reserve fund balance in the general and sewer funds are funds that are used for specific equipment and projects.

Mayor Penders further explained that this budget continues to provide all services to the residents with no changes; included in the budget are replacement of vehicles and equipment; road work, repairs and improvements to the gazebo, exterior improvements to the village office and replacement of sidewalks on main street.

Mr. West asked based on the cost of the new sewer truck could the flushing of sewers be contracted out.

Superintendent West explained that despite the cost of the truck it would be too costly to contract the work out and in addition the village does sewer work for Monroe County and the schools.

Mayor Penders and Electric Superintendent McIntee explained that electric department budget highlighting that no tax dollars go to the electric fund and that equipment and materials for projects are purchased as income is realized from the sale of service.

Mayor Penders continued to explain that the tax rate has gone down approximately 8% to offset the 8% increase in the Village assessments. Mayor Penders further explained the sewer operating fund, debt fund, tax levy and 2% tax cap calculations.

Discussion ensued regarding future refuse rates at landfills to the Village.

There being no further questions Mayor Penders closed the public hearing at 7:43 p.m.

Approval of Minutes

The minutes from the Village Board Meeting March 6, 2019 were approved as presented by Mayor Penders, seconded by Trustee Hopson and carried unanimously.

Jill Cordts, Amity Street indicated that she is here on behalf of the Spencerport Area Chamber of Commerce and Chair of the Bridge Committee and requested that the temporary sign permit approval be waived during the bridge closure to allow for businesses to advertise more during this closure.

Eric Stowe, Village Attorney indicated that a it would need a local law change.

Mayor Penders indicated that the Village Board and the Village Attorney will work to make the local law change.

Deputy Mayor Nellis-Ewell asked Ms. Cordts to forward her suggestion to her.

WHEREAS, The Village Board of Trustees of the Village of Spencerport has previously executed a quit claim deed conveying whatever interest they may have in real property located on vacant land referred to as Ballard Avenue to Christopher Nyiri and Heather M. Heale (Grantees); and

WHEREAS, in exchange for the execution of the deed, the Grantees executed an easement in favor of the Village of Spencerport on a neighboring parcel owned by the Grantees; and

WHEREAS, the above-referenced deed was recorded in the Monroe County Clerk's Office in Liber 12149 of Deeds at Page 484 and the above-referenced easement was recorded in Liber 12149 of Deeds at Page 478;

WHEREAS, subsequent to the recording of the deed in the Monroe County Clerk's Office, the Monroe County Real Property Department indicated the County records show the land in question may have been a highway, based upon a recorded subdivision map; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Spencerport has no record of an offer of dedication for said parcel, no record of accepting dedication of said roadway, the parcel has no improvements indicative of a highway and the parcel has never been used as a highway or a public right-of-way; and

WHEREAS, Monroe County Real Property has indicated the tax map identification number to be assigned to the parcel upon a confirming resolution pursuant to New York State Highway Law §205(1) will be the same as the Grantee's parcel; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to New York State Highway Law §205(1) a highway that shall not have been opened and worked within six years from the time it shall have been dedicated to the use of the public, or laid out, shall cease to be a highway; and

WHEREAS, upon the written consent of the Village Board of Trustees the Village Superintendent may file and cause to be recorded in the Village Clerk's Office a written description of the purported highway to be abandoned;

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Village of Spencerport does hereby consent to the Superintendent of the Department of Public Works of the Village of Spencerport filing the annexed description of purported highway to be abandoned, pursuant to New York State Highway Law §205(1); be it further

RESOLVED that the Mayor of the Village of Spencerport is authorized to execute any documentation necessary to confirm, in writing, the Board of Trustee's consent to this action.
